

Paul Cairney is Professor of Politics and Public Policy, University of Stirling. His research interests are in comparative public policy, including: comparisons of policy theories (Understanding Public Policy, 2012), methods (Handbook of Complexity and Public Policy, 2015, co-edited with Robert Geyer) and the use of evidence (The Politics of Evidence-Based Policy Making, 2016); policy outcomes in different countries (Global Tobacco Control, 2012 (with Donley Studlar and Hadii Mamudu), Scottish politics (The Scottish Political System Since Devolution, 2011 and Scottish Politics 2<sup>nd</sup> ed, 2013 with Neil McGarvey), comparisons of UK and devolved policymaking ('Has Devolution Changed the British Policy Style?', British Politics, 3, 3, 350-72), and comparisons of policy outcomes across the UK ('Policy Convergence, Transfer and Learning in the UK under Devolution', Regional and Federal Studies, 22, 3, 289 -307 with Michael Keating and Eve Hepburn). He was funded (October 2013-15) by the Economic and Social Research Council to research the policymaking process in Scotland, focusing on areas such as preventative spending, and is currently funded by Horizon2020 to research policies designed to reduce territorial inequalities.
